Annual General Meeting - November 21

The AGM of the Frankston Beach Association will be held on Sunday 21st November at 11:00am. in the upstairs function room of the Frankston Yacht Club. The meeting will review the activities of the Association throughout 2010, and importantly, elect the new committee for 2011. If you are interested in joining the committee, or nominating someone else, then please see the Nomination Form at the back of this newsletter. In particular, we are looking for a new Secretary that can progressively take over duties of the existing incumbent (see position details below).

Our guest speaker this year will be Dr. Bill Robinson, a retired vetinary surgeon and Frankston kayaker. Bill will talk on his experiences in kayaking the waters of both Port Phillip Bay and Bass Strait.

Damage to Port Phillip Bay Beaches

Whilst we wait for Frankston City Council to receive a response from their consultants, relating to recommended studies for future beach and foreshore management, we set out a few reasons below why rigorous environmental coastal studies are so necessary.

Frankston beach is one of the most popular bathing beaches along the east side of Port Phillip Bay. It is not necessary to look far from Frankston to see the extent of the damage mostly caused by marina breakwaters and groynes, built on the eastern coastline of the Bay.

The beaches of Sandringham, Hampton, Brighton, St. Kilda and Middle Park, in their original state, were golden sandy beaches, having a beautiful attraction for open sea bathing. Today these beaches have been largely destroyed and polluted, and can no longer be enjoyed as bathing beaches. Other popular bathing beaches in Port Phillip such as at Frankston, Mornington, Mt. Martha, Rye, Blairgowrie and Portsea are under threat.

The coastal reserve areas for most of Australia are provided for under the Constitution of Australia. Since the 1960's the management of these reserves has largely been placed under the jurisdiction of local Councils. Society is continuing to pressure local councils for development of these foreshore reserves to provide such facilities as bathing boxes, boat launching ramps, bowling clubs, bicycle paths, caravan parks, car parks, croquet clubs, fishing clubs, life saving clubs, marinas, piers, playgrounds, public toilets, restaurants, sea baths, skate board facilities, walking paths, yacht clubs and yacht maintenance facilities.

All these developments bring their own forms of environmental destruction and pollution. Governments and councils have ploughed huge sums of money into providing these facilities from which they are now dependent on receiving a financial return. In fact, many of these facilities would be less destructive if they were simply located away from the foreshore

Councils have generally not undertaken coastal environmental studies and coastal modelling before approving such developments, claiming that such studies are too costly to undertake. The facts are that development without prior coastal studies is a recipe for a disaster.

As a result of the construction and enlargement of marinas at St. Kilda, Brighton

and Sandringham, the near-by beaches and foreshore reserves, have been destroyed and desecrated. So for more than 60 years, millions of dollars have been spent on unsuccessful beach restoration projects.

Rigorous environmental studies, prior to approval of such developments will demonstrate likely environmental and financial outcomes. There is no alternative satisfactory option, and less than rigorous studies is a waste of time and money, and will likely produce inaccurate forecasts. The Central Coastal Board have acknowledged that for the whole of Port Phillip Bay there is a dearth of environmental data suitable for coastal modelling and that gathering such data, particularly as to the quantities of sand translocation, is a necessary endeavour.

The other main reason for requiring rigorous coastal modelling studies to be carried out before any development of a Frankston marina commences, is that following 20 years of deliberation and considering much evidence, three Planning Panels and three Planning Ministers require such studies to be undertaken.

Foreshore Planting Report

During 2010, the FBA work group and volunteers, together with Frankston City Council Ranger, Danny Caswell and supporting staff, commenced a new restoration project on the Frankston foreshore. This project falls under 'Caring for our Country' federal government grant scheme and involves the restoration of the primary dune between the Frankston Yacht Club and the Frankston Life Saving Club. In total, 6,000 species were planted between April and October 2010. That means the project is now half way through the planting, and will recommence in April 2011 when the weather returns to more "plant friendly" conditions.

Apart from our regular FBA work group and council officers, our volunteers task force has included the assistance of up to 45 students from Monash University, as well as 20 volunteers who joined in on National Tree Day. We are very pleased that six new volunteers have joined our regular work group during the 2010 season. Over the year, our volunteers have contributed a total of 478 hours of labour, giving an in-kind contribution of \$14,340.



We have achieved the best results for years for our newly planted species. Of course we have been blessed with good rainfalls, but we believe it also was due to a new planting technique that we have introduced, courtesy of Russell Bailey, a member of our regular work group.

Five of our volunteers joined with FCC and a number of school students on World Environment Day to plant 700 indigenous species on a newly formed dune at the Pier Forecourt. Thank you to Alison Kuiter and five students of a Peninsula Special School who also planted 300 indigenous species on the west side of the boardwalk south of the pier.

Because of our busy planting season on the foreshore dune, propagation of indigenous plants at the FCC indigenous nursery (by FBA volunteers) has been pretty much on hold. However, we are looking forward to restart this program through the remaining months of 2010 and into 2011.

We require volunteers for propagation activities, as well as planting and maintenance on the foreshore. Planting has now ceased until next Autumn, however watering of the new tube stock, weeding, etc is still required. THURSDAY is our preferred work day but please contact our Secretary, if another day is preferred (details on the front page of this newsletter). The Secretary can explain further details like the location of the work, dates where volunteers are required and just what the work entails.

Grants

Our association has recently been successful in applying for a grant of \$5,000 through the Port Phillip and Westernport Catchment Management Authority. The purpose of this grant is to purchase low shrubs, sedges and ground covers to halt erosion and serious environmental weed problems on the dune system north of Beach St. This will not only provide support to the remnant vegetation by introducing a strong indigenous understory of coastal dune shrubs, but will also protect the primary dune from erosion.

The project covers two sites -

- Mile Bridge, 0.5ha (one of the largest patches of good quality remnant vegetation on the Frankston foreshore).
- Long Island foreshore between Annie Street and Fiocchi Ave, 0.75ha. A revegetation project completed here in 2009 (6,000 species at a cost of \$19,000) yielded very poor results, so this area will now undergo further revegetation.

The \$5,000 will cover the purchase of approx. 3,000 indigenous species (about half of the required number of plants). The remaining 3,000 species will be jointly provided by FCC and the FBA. Work on the planting will commence in 2011.
